However those who skated out saw a good game and although we did not win by as large a score as Indiana it is evident that Wabash has a ball team and a bunch of hitters that will be heard from before the middle of June.

Every man up landed on the ball and although many of the tries fell in fielders hands, the way they stepped into it was good to see.
The game was to have started at 4:35, but the umpire fell through the ice on the way over and the game was delayed in the hope be would put in an appearance. After about half an hour delay, Coach Cayou accepted the honor of umpiring and the game started.

Capt. Beam of the Baptists decided not to pitch and sent in a freshman find from Tennessee, by the name of Hazelmire. He looked the part and it devolped that he could pitch. Just a week before the semi-professionals were forced to accept a $2-0$ score, with but one hit to thelr credit, and this time the "Little Giants" gave them the rame dose without a hit. The contest was exciting from be ginning to end, but especially so during the first five innings in which time neither team was able to score. It was a fight of the pitchers and Wabash easily showed her superiority. Dobbins sent curves over and about the plate that kept the opponents guessing all the time. When Shaffer entered the box in the last of the sixth the visitors expected an easy proposition, but they were again puzzled. They soon found that they needed more experience in the batting line to connect with the scarlet twirlers. On the other hand however, Diddel's men had no mean proposition to oppose. "Fritz" Holmes proved a strong man for Waynetown, allowing only four hits.
The first score came in the fifth, when Faunce sent one to Kline, and succeeded in reaching first on the erior of the shortstop. Two men were already down, but this time it didn't matter. The next man, Dobbins, hit one to Freeman on second, too hot to handle, and Faunce attempted to go around to third. On Freeman's assist to Sumner on third, who errored, Faunce scored the first run.
